SCHOLARSHIPS

Aubrey W. Russell 4-H Scholarship

The Aubrey W. Russell Scholarship is a \$600 scholarship to assist a worthy District 2 4-H member to attend a college or university in the South Plains District (2) to major in home economics or a related field. An additional scholarship(s) may be awarded if there are two or more eligible applicants and contributions are adequate. The scholarship is awarded as follows: \$300 for the Fall semester following the judging, and \$300 for the Spring semester following judging.

Donors:

This scholarship fund is made up of voluntary contributions from Family and Community Education Clubs, individuals, and other groups in the Extension South Plains District (2).

Eligibility:

- 1. Has completed or is enrolled in the third year of 4-H in the South Plains District.
- 2. Has not previously won this scholarship.
- 3. Plans to major in home economics or related field, including education, food technology, or pre-nursing.
- 4. Plans to attend (or is attending) a college or university in the South Plains District that offers a pre-home economics degree or bachelor's degree in home economics or related field, as mentioned above.
- 5. Plans to attend the Fall and Spring semesters following scholarship judging.
- 6. Meets entrance requirements at the selected college or university.

Materials to be Submitted:

- 1. A completed 2015 Texas 4-H Foundation Opportunity Scholarship Application Form (abbreviated copy). Available from the Extension Office.
- 2. One copy of high school transcript or college transcript, if applicable.

Due Date:

The application materials are due to the Lubbock County Extension Office by *February 13*. Let us know if you are interested.

TX 4-H Foundation Scholarship

Texas 4-H Scholarship applications are due to the County Extension Office by *Monday*, *February 2*.

Qualifications for submitting a 4-H Foundation Baccalaureat Scholarship application include: Texas resident who will graduate from a Texas high school during the 2014-2015 school year, has a minimum SAT score of 1350 or ACT

score of 19, has passed the TAAS/TASP test and plans on attending a Texas college or university. If you have any questions, please give us a call. A completed FAFSA is also required.

There are two other categories of 4-H Foundation Scholarships. These include: Technical-plan to attend a technical school for specialized training; and Courageous Heart - nominated by an individual or leader, must have documentation of overcoming a life obstacle such as medical, family or education (may not be nominated by a relative). Applications may be picked up from the Extension Office or from the State 4-H Website. Please contact Ronda if you need assistance or have questions.

TEEA 4-H Scholarship

The Texas Extension Education Association is once again offering on \$1,000 scholarship in each Extension district (total of 12) for deserving Texas 4-H members.

The eligible requirements for those applying are:

• Be a United States citizen.

- Be currently an active senior 4-H member in good standing with county 4-H program for the last four (4) years.
- Demonstrate leadership and personal development through 4-H.
- Will attend an accredited institution of higher learning: university, community college, trade or technical school in fall following judging.
- Have not passed 19th birthday before January 1 of current year.
- Have not previously received the State TEEA scholarship.
- Complete a Texas 4-H Recordbook (updated through previous year's Texas 4-H Recordbook judging deadline).
- Complete TEEA 4-H Scholarship Application and provide other required materials.

Application submission process includes:

- 1. Postmarked on or before *February 13*, submit to the county AgriLife Extension office in a manila envelope:
 - Envelope labeled with the applicant's name and county.
 - Only a black and white copy of Texas 4-H Recordbook from the previous year's Texas 4-H Recordbook judging deadline of August 31 accepted.
 - Official high school transcript with ACT and/or SAT scores included.
- Completed TEEA 4-H Scholarship Application.
 - Two letters of recommendation: one from a county Extension agent or 4-H club manager and one from a teacher, employer, or community leader (not a relative).
- If the applicant wants these materials returned, include a postage-paid, self-addressed envelope and letter of request.

Deadline for submission to county Extension Office is *February 13, 2015.*

TEEA Alumnae Young Adult Scholarship

The number of scholarships and the amount are dependent on availability of funds. Funds for the scholarship are raised by donations, memorials, and fundraisers by members of the Alumnae Committee. Anyone may contribute to this scholarship fund.

General Information

1. The applicant must be a former 4-H member **or** the son/daughter or grandson/granddaughter of a current TEEA member.

- 2. The applicant must be between the ages of 19 and 24 at the time of application.
- 3. Applications are available from County Association Chairs, District Directors, and the Chair of the Alumnae Committee. A copy of the application is also located in the TEEA Manual (Chapter 12) and on the TEEA website (http://teea.tamu.edu/manual/chapter12.pdf).
- 4. Applications are due by *February 13* to the Chair of the TEEA Alumnae Committee.
- 5. Applications will be judged at the TEEA Spring Board meeting and winners will be notified after the meeting.
- 6. The applicant must remain a full-time student, or the amount will be returned to TEEA.
- 7. The scholarship may be applied for use at the beginning of the school semester and used as needed.

Lubbock County Parent Leaders Scholarship

The Lubbock County Parent Leaders Association and South Plains Fair are sponsoring a Scholarship program for 4-H youth completing their Senior High School year. These applications are due to the County Extension Office the same time record books are due. The information needed covers three years of your Senior 4-H career with the final year being your Senior High School year. If you did not receive a form, or have misplaced yours, contact the County Extension Office to receive another form. The form is your responsibility to complete the required items and to keep track of.

First place winners from the County Fashion Show will advance to the District Competition. The **County Fashion Show** is tentatively scheduled to be held in March. More info will be sent when all plans are finalized.

The entry divisions include:

<u>Construction</u>: garments made by sewing, knitting, or crocheting.

Buying: clothing purchased at a department store, specialty store, in a catalog, outlet or resale store, or from a professional seamstress. The 4-H'er must comparison shop, comparing 3 similar garments, and then purchase the one of their choice.

Texas 4-H Fashion Storyboard Contest

The Fashion Storyboard is a version of the presentation boards that are used in the fashion industry for selling and communicating ideas. The purpose of the Fashion Storyboard Contest is to give 4-H members an opportunity to create illustrations of their original design and display their work in a storyboard format, similar to that used in the fashion industry. Through project work, the 4-H member has the opportunity to gain knowledge of the career responsibilities of a fashion designer and illustrator, enhance creativity and originality and develop visual communication skills.

- Open to any meat goat exhibitor residing in Lubbock County - No minimum age, must not exceed the age of 19 or a Senior in High School (All ages will be determined as of January 1, 2015.)
- 2. Must be state or county validated.
- 3. Weathers and/or does allowed.
- 4. Minimum weight 50 lbs. no maximum
- 5. Horns allowed, but must be tipped.
- 6. Must be uniformly slicked sheared, no longer than 3/8 inch above the hocks.
- 7. Complete set of milk teeth, not required.
- 8. BRACING WILL BE AT THE DISCRETION OF THE JUDGE.
- 9. Official weigh-in 5:00-6:00 pm.
- 10. Buckles awarded for Grand, Reserve Grand.
- 11. Showmanship will be judged this year! 4 Classes
- 12. Buckles to Showmanship Winners Sr. (15-19 years old), Intermediate 12-14 years old), Junior (8-11 years old), PeeWee (7 years old and under).
- 13. Show out of trailer.

ENTRY FEE IS \$25 PER HEAD, POSTMARKED NO LATER THAN JANUARY 2, 2015. Late entry fees will be accepted at \$50 per head. The entry fee is non-refundable.

SCHOOL EXCUSES

The form for School Excuses were due **December 2014** to the County Extension Office. If you are going to miss school due to Stock shows, and have not turned in a form, obtain a form and return it to the Extension Office **immediately**. Unless a form is turned in, a letter for an excused absence on your behalf will not be sent to your school.

REMINDER: Blanket excuses and eligibility information has been requested by our office for the shows entered. Parents, please notify your 4-H'ers principal of the exact dates of upcoming school absences. Make sure that you understand your school district's policy for the 10 day/

90% attendance requirements. Visit with school instructors to determine plans concerning homework, tests, projects, etc. and to make sure that your 4-Her is passing all subjects prior to and during the absence period. Eligibility for competing in any event must be determined prior to the event, whether you are missing school or not. The Extension Office sends correspondence for all events to each school prior to the competition. In order for youth to compete they must be considered academically eligible by your school.

4-H CONCESSION HELP

4-H needs your help at the 4-H Concession at the Lubbock County Junior Livestock Show. Each 4-H volunteer or parent can help in many ways. We will schedule volunteers on an individual basis not by club groupings. We need representation from each 4-H club to make this event a success. Help is needed from every family, not just those involved in the stock show. Volunteers can be age 12 to Adult. AIMING FOR THE BULL'S EYE 4-H Shooting Sports Review



The time is at hand to begin 2015 Spring 4-H Shooting Sports projects, which includes the smallbore rifle and archery projects. If you have not registered with the county office for these projects, please call 775-1740 at your earliest convenience to make sure you are on our contact list for 2015 Shooting Sports Updates.

2015 3-Position Rifle Project

The spring rifle project involves indoor target shooting in the prone, standing, and kneeling positions. Firearms and equipment are provided. The project is taught by NRA-certified volunteer coaches. Shooters must provide hearing protection (foam ear plugs work best) and eye protection. The project will include county, district, and state competition levels.

A project orientation for new shooters (including gun safety) will be held at the County extension Office building, 916 Main Street on Tuesday, January 13 at 7:00 p.m. on the first floor. Please enter through the East doors of the building.

KAY'S KORNER

Take Precautions to keep the common cold at bay

That "achy, coughing, stuffy so you can't breath" feeling that comes around generally at this time of year is annoying, but normally harmless, according to a Texas AgriLife Extension Service specialist.

"A cold is usually harmless though it may not feel that way," said Andrew Crocker, Agrilife Extension gerontology specialist. "Although more than 200 viruses can cause a common cold, the rhinovirus is the most common culprit and it is highly contagious."

The common cold is a viral infection of the nose and throat, Crocker said. The virus can spread through droplets in the air when someone coughs, sneezes or talks. But it also spreads by contact with someone who has a cold or by sharing objects.

Because of the sheer number of viruses that may be responsible for the cold, symptoms may vary greatly, he said. Symptoms usually appear two to three days after contact and may include: mucous buildup in the nose causing difficulty breathing, swelling of the sinuses, sneezing, sore throat, cough and headache.

"During a cold, you generally will not have a high fever and you are also unlikely to experience significant fatigue," Crocker said. "Complications associated with your cold may include ear infection, wheezing, sinusitis and/or other infections, including but not limited to strep throat, pneumonia and bronchitis."

He stressed these infections need to be treated by a health care provider.

"There is no cure for the common cold and antibiotics are of no use against viruses," Crocker said. "Over-the-counter cold medicines will not cure a common cold or make it go away any sooner and most have some potential side effects."

Side effects may include:

• Pain relievers. For fever, sore throat and headache, many people turn to acetaminophen (e.g. Tylenol) or other mild pain relievers. Keep in mind that these can be harmful if taken more frequently or in larger doses than recommended.

- Decongestant nasal sprays. Nasal sprays may provide some relief from cold symptoms. Do not use decongestant drops or sprays for more than a few days because prolonged use can cause chronic inflammation of mucous membranes.
- Cough suppressants. Non-prescription cough suppressants may relieve some cold symptoms, however, because most of these medicines have some side effects, such as drowsiness, dizziness, insomnia, or upset stomach, they should be taken with care. Some contain ingredients that may alleviate coughing; however, persistent coughs should be treated by a health provider.

"You may not be able to cure your common cold, but you can make yourself as comfortable as possible," Crocker said.

Some helpful tips include:

- Plenty of fluids, such as water, juice and warm soup, help replace fluids lost during mucus production or fever. Avoid alcohol and caffeine which can cause dehydration.
- Chicken soup will help with some immune system functions, and it temporarily speeds up the movement of mucus through the nose, helping relieve congestion and limiting the time viruses are in contact with the nasal lining.
- Stay home and get rest if you have a fever or a bad cough, or are drowsy from medications. This offers the opportunity to rest as well as reduces the chances to infect others.
- Soothe the throat by gargling with warm salt water.
- Saline spray or nasal drops help relieve nasal congestion and can be bought over-the-counter.

Most people recover from a common cold in about a week or two, Crocker said. If symptoms do not improve, then a trip to the health provider may be necessary.

"You should also see your health provider if you develop a fever (102 degrees or higher for adults) accompanied by achiness and fatigue; fever accompanied by sweating, chills and a cough with colored phlegm; significantly swollen glands and/or severe sinus pain," he said.

No vaccine has been developed for the common cold and results of studies using complimentary methods to prevent a cold such as zinc, vitamin C and Echinacea are inconclusive, Crocker said.

However, some common-sense precautions to take to slow the spread of cold viruses include:

- Wash your hands with warm water and soap. Carry a bottle of alcohol-based hand rub containing at least 60 percent alcohol for times when soap and water are not available these gels kill most germs.
- Keep kitchen and bathroom countertops clean, especially when someone in your family has a common cold.
- Sneeze or cough into the bend of the elbow to cover your mouth without using your hands.
- Do not share drinking glasses or utensils with others.

• Avoid close, prolonged contact with anyone who has a cold.
