The Lubbock County Parent Leaders Association is sponsoring a Scholarship Program for county 4-H youth completing their Senior High School year.


Applications are due at the same time as recordbooks - <u>June 20</u>, and are available on the County website.

RECORDBOOK WORKSHOP

If you haven't attended a county recordbook workshop, please contact Ronda to be sure you are using the correct



forms if you plan to complete a 4-H recordbook. The recordbook consists of a binder (doesn't have to be a 4-H binder), the personal information page, the 4-H story and photo portfolio and the District 2 or Senior 4-H Report form. All of these forms are available on the County 4-H website. The 4-H Recordbook Participant Guidelines will also assist you in putting the correct information together. For intermediate and juniors - DO NOT use the forms off of the State 4-H website – they are different.

Texas Tech Summer Camps

Texas Tech is offering 3 different summer camps: Fashion Camp - June 27 - July 1, 8-12 year olds; Fashion Camp - June 27 - July 1, 13-18 year olds; and Chef Camp - June 27 - July 1, 13-18 year olds. Registration is due *May 31*.

Texas 4-H Congress

Texas 4-H Congress is a four-day mock legislative experience for 4-H members who will be in 9th through 12th grade for the 2016-2017 school year, also eligible to attend are 4-H youth who graduated high school in the spring of 2016. During this time, 4-H members assume the roles of senators, representatives, lobbyists, press corps, and special interest groups to gain a first-hand understanding of how the legislative process works. Bills that are written and sponsored by 4-H members focus on issues concerning Texas and Texas youth. 4-H'ers are required to submit a bill in order to attend. These bills are assigned to the appropriate committee, debated in

committee meetings, and then on the floor of the House or Senate. If a bill is successful in negotiation and the legislative debate in all three stages, it is delivered to the Governor of Texas 4-H Congress for his or her signature or veto. Copies of all the bills that are signed into law during Texas 4-H Congress are provided to the Office of the Governor for review. Congress is held in Austin at the State Capital, **July 17-20**; cost is \$375 per person, including transportation to and from Austin. Registration opens on 4-H Connect May 1 and closes on *May 31*.

STATE 4-H ROUNDUP COMMUNITY SERVICE

This year the Texas 4-H Council has selected Eli's Fund for their statewide charitable giving campaign effort. This memorial fund was established for Lance Corporal Colton Rusk of Orange Grove, TX. Eli, a bomb-sniffing military working dog was assigned to US Lance Cpl. Colton Rusk. In December, 2010, Lance Cpl. Rusk was killed by sniper fire in Afghanistan. Eli, ever faithful to his handler was left depressed and alone. He would not leave Lance Cpl. Rusk's cot at the base for several weeks. In February 2011 Lance Cpl. Rusk's family in South Texas was allowed to adopt Eli. The Texas Veterinary Medical Foundation (College of Veterinary Medicine, CVM) has pledged to cover all of Eli's veterinary care for the rest of his life. The CVM established Eli's Fund as a source of financial support for active duty service men and women, medically retired veterans' service animals and retired military animals.

The Council has set at goal of \$15,000 to be raised from now until Texas 4-H Roundup through this effort. Donations are to be sent directly at http://vetmed.tamu.edu/giving/opportunities/elis-fund. 4-H HORSE PROJECTS

District 4-H Horse Show

The 2016 District 24-H Horse Show will

be held **June 13-14** at the Texas Tech Equestrian Center in Lubbock. This year's show will be a two day event. All entries (which includes a one-time \$75 District exhibitor fee) must be entered on 4-H connect between *May 16 and June 3*, 2016. Late entries will be accepted until June 8 and will include an exhibitor fee of \$100.00 (no t-shirt will be provided). Entries will be completed on 4-H Connect. The Texas Tech Equestrian Center will handle the stalling arrangements and stall fee. Coggins will need to be presented to the stalling committee before stalls will be assigned. Registration information will be sent to all 4-H'ers who completed horse validation, when it becomes available. Horse validation was due by May 1 on 4-H Connect.

The 2016 Texas 4-H Horse Show Rules and Regulations contain all the changes, with important revisions in red type. All 4-H'ers and families should be familiar with the revised rules. They can be found at

State 4-H Horse Show Information

The State 4-H Horse Show will be held in Abilene, **July 23-30.** State entries will be due on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>June 14</u> at the Office for the District 4-H Horse Show. 4-H Horse Validation

Registration and validation was **due** on 4-H Connect by **May 1**, for anyone planning on showing at the District or State 4-H Horse Show. If you have not turned these in, you will not be allowed to show. There are no exceptions.

State 4-H Roping School

On June 19-23, 2016, the Statewide Texas 4-H Calf Roping and Break-A-Way School will be held in Stephenville, Texas. The school will be held at the Tarleton State University Equine Arena. This event has been developed in order to encourage young people in 4-H to develop leadership skills and to exercise their abilities in working with younger members in roping activities in 4-H. Participation is open to all districts of the state, with applications being accepted on a first-come, first- serve basis with first priority to those boys and girls who are 12 years of age and older. The cost of the school will be \$425.00 for the week. There is a limited number of indoor stalls. Therefore, a maximum of one horse per applicant. Awards will be presented at the conclusion of the Roping School. This will include group insurance, meals, lodging, stall rent for one horse and will cover the cost of practice calves used in the teaching process. Most meals will be taken in the Tarleton State University Dining Hall. All students will be housed in the Tarleton State University Dormitories. Students will not be allowed to stay elsewhere. Applications are currently being accepted on a first-come basis. An Adult chaperone may also be required.

4-H Horse Project Leader Training

Registration for the first 4-H Horse Project Leader Training is now open in 4-H Connect. The training will be held at the Bell County Expo Center **June 3-4, 2016** in Temple. To register simply click on the event "4-H Horse Project Leader Training" on 4-H connect and select either Adult Volunteer from the menu to register. The cost for attendance is \$60 for volunteers, which includes over \$100 worth of teaching aids and meals. An agenda is available, contact Ronda if you would like more information.

Youth Range Workshop

The 61st Annual Youth Range Workshop is being held on **June 26-July 1, 2016** at the Texas Tech University Center at Junction, Texas. Registration of 4-H and FFA youth for this 6 day training is open. Up to 4 youth from the ages of 14-17 years old who have an interest in the management of

the largest natural resource in the state of Texas, rangeland will be accepted to participate in the workshop. The workshop covers 26 major topic areas of knowledge from rangeland ecology, ecological principles, natural resource management, rangelands of the world, plant identification, toxic plants, plant collecting, rangeland hydrology and watershed management, grazing management, range animal nutrition, management tools such as prescribed burning, land and ranch planning, wildlife management, the water cycle, endangered species, invasive organisms, rangeland monitoring, daily public speaking activities, leadership roles and many more. During the week, field trips are made away from the Tech Center to the Kerr Wildlife Management Area near Hunt, a ranch in Menard County and a ranch in Mason County. Training is provided in a classroom setting but is followed up with hands-on training outdoors in the field. The Workshop directors have a great expectation from this opportunity that participating youth will return home not to just help make decisions on family property but that they become a resource in their individual county and serve as a junior leader or teen leader in the 4-H range science project area. The Youth Range Workshop has been held every year since 1955. More than 2000 Texas youth have participated in this learning opportunity. The workshop concerns education and knowledge but recreation from swimming, volleyball and softball are all part of the daily activities of this program. 4-H youth from all over the state of Texas participate in this event. KAY's KORNER

Bites for Better Tasting Fruits and Vegetables

Bite 1. Prevent cut fruit from turning brown.

Keep cut fruits, such as apples, pears, bananas and peaches, from turning brown by coating them with an acidic juice such as lemon, orange or pineapple juice. Or use a commercial anti-darkening preparation with fruits, such as Fruit-Fresh®, and follow the manufacturer's directions. Another method to prevent browning is to mix them with acidic fruits like oranges, tangerines, grapefruit and other citrus fruit or pineapple. Prepare the acidic fruit(s) first. Then, cut the other fruits, mixing them with in the acidic fruit(s) as you prepare them. Cut fruits as close to serving time as possible. Cover and refrigerate cut fruit until ready to serve. Refrigerate peeled/cut fruits and vegetables so they are at room temperature no longer than 2 hours, TOTAL time.

Bite 2. Make the most of your mellon baller.

- Melon ballers, those little kitchen gadget with a scoop at each end of a handle about 6 inches long, can save valuable time in preparing fruits and veggies. Even if you never make melon balls, use a melon baller to:
- Core apples and pears.
- Cut away the inner membrane from peppers.
- Scoop out the inside of a cherry tomato and make tiny stuffed appetizers. Try stuffing the tomatoes with your favorite tuna salad sandwich mixture.
- Remove seeds and surrounding pulp from fruits and veggies like cucumbers, tomatoes, zucchini papaya and kiwi.
- Scoop out the insides of potatoes for twice-baked potatoes.

Bite 3. Take a salad spinner for a spin!

Salad dressing slides off damp salad greens and collects in the bottom of the salad bowl. You'll get more flavor with less dressing (and fewer calories!) if salad greens are washed and dried before tossing your salad with dressing. A tablespoon of an oil and vinegar dressing may be all it takes for two cups of dried salad greens.

The easiest and quickest way to dry salad greens is in a salad spinner. A salad spinner uses centrifugal force to remove water from freshly washed salad greens and herbs. Your wet greens are placed in a perforated basket that fits in a larger outer bowl. The bowl is covered with a lid that has a gear-operated handle, pull-cord or knob that you pump to turn the inner basket and spin the water off into the outer bowl. Pack greens lightly to avoid overcrowding

and bruising them. After spinning, pat off any remaining moisture with clean paper towels. When purchasing a salad spinner, take it for a spin at the store! You want a model that is sturdy, has a well-fitting lid and spins easily. Choose a model large enough so you don't have to go through several "spin cycles" to dry all your greens. A salad spinner also may be used to dry washed clusters of grapes. Note: If you are preparing small clusters of grapes for garnishing, cut the clusters with scissors. This helps keep the grapes attached to the stem.

Bite 4. Do this with radishes before refrigeration.

If the leafy radish tops are attached, remove them before storing. Radishes don't keep as well if their tops are left on. Store unwashed radishes in an open or perforated plastic bag in a refrigerator crisper drawer that is separate from the one in which you store fruits. Wash radishes and trim their roots just before using

Bite 5. Wash fruits and vegetables correctly.

The Food and Drug Administration recommended the following preparation tips for fresh produce (updated 8/17/2010):

- Wash produce. Many pre-cut, bagged produce items like lettuce are pre-washed. If so, ti will be stated onthe packaging. This pre-washed, bagged produce can be used without further washing.
- As an extra measure of caution, you can wash the produce again just before you use it. Pre-cut or prewashed produce in open bags should be washed before using.
- Being with clean hands. Wash your hands for 20 seconds with warm water and soap before and after preparing fresh produce.
- Cut away any damaged or bruised areas on fresh fruits and vegetables before preparing or eating. Produce that looks rotten should be discarded.
- All unpackaged fruits and vegetables, as well as those packaged and not marked pre-wahsed, should be thoroughly washed before eating. This suggestion includes produce grown conventionally or organically at home, or produce that is purchased from a grocery store or farmer's market. Wash fruits and vegetables under running water just before eating, cutting, or cooking.
- Even if you plan to peel the produce before eating, is is still important to wash it first.
- Washing fruits and vegetables with soap or detergent or using commercial produce washes is NOT recommended.
- Scrub firm produce, such as melons and cucumbers, with a clean produce brush.

Bite 6. Know which fruits ripen after they're picked.

Apricots, bananas, cantaloupe, kiwi, nectarines, peaches, pears, plantains and plums continue to ripen after they're picked. The tomato, which is actually a fruit, also continues to ripen after picking.

Fruits that you should pick or buy ripe and ready-to-eat include: apples, cherries, grapefruit, grapes, oranges, pineapple, strawberries, tangerines, and watermelon.

To speed the ripening of fruits such as peaches, pears, and plums, put them in a ripening bowl or in a loosely closed brown paper bag at room temperature. Plastic bags don't work for ripening.

Bite 7. Refrigerate fruits and vegetables in perforated plastic bags.

This helps maintain moisture yet provides for air flow. Unperforated plastic bags can lean to the growth of mold or bacteria. If you don't have access to commercial, foodgrade, perforated bags, use a sharp object to make several small holes in a food-grade plastic bag (about 20 holes per medium-size bag).
