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4-H ENROLLMENT TIME

It is time to enroll in 4-H for the 2015-16 year. It will again only be done through 4-H Connect and the yearly membership fee of \$20/member for September and October is in effect. As of November 1st, it will be \$25; Clover kids do not have to pay an enrollment fee, but still need to enroll. If you were in 4-H last year - you have a profile - please use your email and profile that you had last year. If you have forgotten your password 4-H Connect will send you a new one. Please do not

create a new profile if you had one last year. Please contact Ronda if you have questions or problems enrolling.



Please remember that 4-H has changed our enrollment to be based on the school grade, instead of the age. Please refer to the information listed below:

4-H Members

- 1. Age Requirements
 - Youth may participate in 4-H year from September 1st of grade three through August 31st following completion of grade twelve, with these age restrictions: • Minimum age - 8 (in addition to being in the 3rd
 - grade)
 - Maximum age 18 (as of August 31, 2016)

• Special education youth who are older than 19 and have not graduated from high school may participate in 4-H Youth Development programs as members, with approval by the county Extension agent. Participation is limited to the club or county level. County Extension staff have the option, on a case-by-case basis, to allow Special Education youth older than 19 to participate in competitive events at the club or county level.


ONE DAY 4-H

VOLUNTEER SCREENING

Volunteers and parents also need to enroll on 4-H Connect; there is a \$5 yearly screening fee.

The fee can be paid online with a credit or debit card when the volunteer profile is completed. Please contact Ronda if you have questions. All adult volunteers who serve in a project or club leadership role who work directly with youth, should be screened. Also, any volunteers who assist in transporting youth in their personal vehicles or who handle 4-H funds should be screened.

Volunteers will be required to complete two online trainings before their screening will be submitted.

Don't forget to enter your crafts, canned goods or baked goods in the Youth Division at the South Plains Fair. There is no cost to enter and prize money is awarded in all divisions. 

Introduction to 2017 Shooting Sports Projects

The 4-H Shooting Sports Project is a comprehensive introduction to shooting sports safety and the fundamentals of shooting disciplines, including: archery, rifle, shotgun, pistol, muzzleloading, and hunting. The project requires the presence and supervision of trained and certified volunteer coaches. Therefore, not all disciplines are offered in all counties. Lubbock County has certified coaches for Rifle, Archery and shotgun.

Also, since direct supervision by certified coaches is a requirement, this program does not allow individual participation. The minimum age to participate in 4-H Shooting Sports, is enrolled in the 3rd grade.

Lubbock County Shooting Sports coaches will soon be meeting to secure locations and set 2017 dates for project start-up, including: 3-position indoor rifle and archery in the spring, and shotgun project in the Summer months.

More details will follow in upcoming newsletters. If you are interested in participating in 4-H Shooting Sports, call the County Extension Office and place your name and which disciplines you are interested in on the "intent to participate" list.

District 2 Shooting Sports Leader Training Scheduled

KAY's KORNER

Top 10 Reasons to Shop at a Farmers Market from Nutrition.gov

1. Freshly picked, in season produce is at its peak in flavor and nutrition. While some fruits and vegetables are harvested year round in the United States, many of them grow for only three to four months each year.

How do stores offer them when they are not in season? The produce is typically grown in a heated greenhouse or imported from another country where it is in season. In some cases (e.g. tomatoes, bananas, pears), fruits are picked early and ethylene gas is used to ripen them before sale. In other cases (e.g., apples, lettuce, potatoes, carrots), storage practices have been honed to make it possible to sell produce weeks to a year after harvesting.

It seems convenient to have access to the same variety of produce all year. However, produce begins to lose nutrients and flavor from the time it is harvested. Produce sold in areas where it is out of season s lower in quality and typically costs much more than produce sold in its local season. Plus, shorter transportation distances involved in buying produce in its season means a smaller carbon footprint which is better for the environment.

- 2. Support your local farmers and economy. The Farmers Market Coalition states that "growers selling locally create thirteen full time farm operator jobs per \$1 million in revenue earned while those that do not sell locally only create three."
- 3. Fresh fruit and vegetables are full of antioxidants and phytonutrients. Antioxidants neutralize free radicals that could otherwise damage the cells of our bodies. Phytonutrients are compounds produced by plants that are believed to help protect the body from certain diseases.

4. It's a great way to get your kids involved. Let them pick out something new to try, then they can help prepare a meal or snack using the Kids in the Kitchen tips and recipes at http://www.nutrition.gov/life-stages/children/kids-kitchen.

- 5. Supporting your local farmers market strengthens your community. "Farmers markets play a vital role in forming healthy, local food systems," says Jen Cheek, Executive Director of the Farmers Market Coalition. "By providing the opportunity for farmers to connect directly with consumers, markets serve as education centers. Vendors are teaching customers about agriculture, sharing recipes, and exposing them to new foods. Markets are making people and communities stronger and healthier."
- 6. Farmers markets offer foods that align with MyPlate guidelines. They offer a variety of fruits and vegetables with which to fill half your plate at meals. Some also carry fresh sources of lean protein, dairy, and whole grains. For more information about MyPlate, visit <u>https://www.choosemyplate.gov/</u>.
- 7. Farmers often have recommendations for preparing their products. Visit Fruits and Veggies More Matters at http://www.fruitsandveggiesmorematters.org/main-r ecipes to see recipes that use fresh fruits and vegetables.
- 8. You can try a new fruit or vegetable! Have you ever tasted gooseberries or rhubarb? Many farmers markets offer lesser known fruits and vegetables, providing a variety that can be both tasty and nutritious. In addition to the VIGA cards, learn how to select and store rare and common fruits and vegetables with the Fruit Nutrition Database at http://www.fruitsandveggiesmorematters.org/fruit-n utrition-database and the Vegetable Nutrition Database at http://www.fruitsandveggiesmorematters.org/vegeta ble-nutrition-database.
- 9. SNAP and WIC benefits are accepted at some farmers markets.
- 10. Farmers markets are easy to find. Use the USDA Farmers Markets Search at <u>https://www.ams.usda.gov/local-food-directories/far</u> <u>mersmarkets</u> to find one near you. It will also tell you if the farmers market accepts SNAP and WIC benefits.

Remember to shop the Downtown Farmers Market on Buddy Holly or the West End Farmers Market on Saturday mornings.

The South Plains Fair would be great to display canning efforts.

Summertime Recipes

California Club Pasta Salad

½ cup lite Ranch Dressing
1/4 cup lite mayo type salad dressing
2 cups Rotini Pasta, cooked and rinsed
1 cup coarsely chopped Romaine lettuce
1 avocado, chopped
½ cup plum tomatoes, chopped
4 slices bacon cooked, crumbled

Mix Ranch Dressing and salad dressing until well blended. Mix together pasta, lettuce, avocado and tomato in a large bowl, stir in dressing. Chill at least 1 hour. Remove and top with bacon.

Marinated Tomato Salad with Herbs

6 to 8 ripe tomatoes, cut in wedges
4 green onions, sliced
1 cup extra virgin olive oil
4 tablespoons balsamic vinegar
2 tablespoons brown sugar
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
Handful fresh parsley leaves, coarsely chopped
12 fresh basil leaves chiffonade

 cup diced onion
 tablespoons vegetable oil
 tablespoons cider vinegar
 tablespoon light mayonnaise type salad dressing
 teaspoon sugar
 teaspoon dill weed
 teaspoon garlic powder
 teaspoon celery powder or celery seed
 teaspoon black pepper.

Thinly slice or julienne squash and red peppers. Combine all ingredients and stir. Cover and refrigerate. Makes 8 servings.
