
Lubbock County Parent Leaders 4-H Scholarship

RECORDBOOK WORKSHOP

If you haven't attended a county recordbook workshop, please contact Ronda to be sure you are using the correct



forms if you plan to complete a 4-H recordbook. The recordbook consists of a binder (doesn't have to be a 4-H binder), the personal information page, the 4-H story and photo portfolio and the District 2 or Senior 4-H Report form. All of these forms are available on the County 4-H website. The 4-H Recordbook Participant Guidelines will also assist you in putting the correct information together. For intermediate and juniors - DO NOT use the forms off of the State 4-H website – they are different.

A beginner's Record Book workshop will be held on **Tuesday, May 23 at 5:30 pm** at the County Extension Office. Bring all of your recordbook questions and materials to begin work on your recordbook. Please call the County Extension Office, 775-1740, by *May 17* if you plan on attending the training. If you are interested in doing a recordbook, but have not been able to attend a training, please contact Ronda for more options.

On **Thursday, June 1** a Recordbook Review Workshop will be held at 6:00 p.m. at the County Extension Office. If you have questions or want a little extra assistance with recordbooks, then this workshop is for you. Please RSVP by *May 26* if you plan to attend.

District 4-H Horse Show

The 2017 District 2 4-H Horse Show will be held **June 20** at the Texas Tech



Equestrian Center in Lubbock. All entries (which includes a one-time \$100 District exhibitor fee) must be entered on 4-H connect between *May 22 and June 3, 2017*. Entries will be completed on 4-H Connect. The Texas Tech Equestrian Center will handle the stalling arrangements and stall fee. Coggins will need to be presented to the stalling committee before stalls will be assigned. Registration information will be sent to all 4-H'ers who completed horse validation, when it becomes available. Horse validation was due by May 1 on 4-H Connect.

Youth Range Workshop

The 63rd Annual Youth Range Workshop is being held on June 18-23, 2017 at the Texas Tech University Center at Junction, Texas. Registration of 4-H and FFA youth for this 6 day training is open. Youth from the ages of 14-18 years old who have an interest in the management of the largest natural resource in the state of Texas, rangeland will be accepted to participate in the workshop. The workshop covers 26 major topic areas of knowledge from rangeland ecology, ecological principles, natural resource management, rangelands of the world, plant identification, toxic plants, plant collecting, rangeland hydrology and watershed management, grazing management, range animal nutrition, management tools such as prescribed burning, land and ranch planning, wildlife management, the water cycle, endangered species, invasive organisms, rangeland monitoring, daily public speaking activities, leadership roles and many more. During the week, field trips are made away from the Tech Center to the Kerr Wildlife Management Area near Hunt, a ranch in Menard

County and a ranch in Mason County. Training is provided in a classroom setting but is followed up with hands-on training outdoors in the field. The Workshop directors have a great expectation from this opportunity that participating youth will return home not to just help make decisions on family property but that they become a resource in their individual county and serve as a junior leader or teen leader in the 4-H range science project area. The Youth Range Workshop has been held every year since 1955. More than 2000 Texas youth have participated in this learning opportunity. The workshop concerns education and knowledge but recreation from swimming. volleyball and softball are all part of the daily activities of this program. 4-H youth from all over the state of Texas participate in this event. KAY's KORNER

How Long Should I Keep It?

Most of us like to save money. We do our best to stretch our dollars and look to get as much out of our purchases as possible. However, where food is concerned, the old saying that all good things must come to an end holds true.

It's a common practice of many to store certain foods in the refrigerator to extend the quality of the foods. However, the question of how long we can keep foods refrigerated is often a mystery. Research shows that the length of time you can store foods in the refrigerator depends on whether or not the food is fresh, unpackaged food, or packaged. It is also important to note whether the package has been opened or whether the food was previously cooked.

Generally speaking, fresh foods, opened foods, and cooked foods should not be kept refrigerated longer than four to seven days. If you want to keep the food longer, it is best to freeze the food and use it later. Doing so will significantly reduce the risk of contracting a food-borne illness.

It is also important to keep in mind that even frozen foods do not last forever. A general rule to follow is that fresh meats should be stored frozen for no longer than three to four months (fresh fish can be stored for up to six months). Items such as bacon, cooked fish, bread and rolls can be stored for up to one month. Frozen eggs, butter, and margarine can be stored for up to one year. Natural and processed cheeses can be stored from four to six months.

Refrigerating/freezing is a great way to save! Here are a few additional tips:

- Research indicates that most of the products claiming to extend the life of vegetables, cheeses, and greens in the refrigerator do not actually stop the decay caused by the natural release of gasses from the food items. It's better to store leftovers in the original packaging and tape the bag shut to ensure freshness.
- The shelving on the door of your refrigerator is the warmest part of the refrigerator. The back of your refrigerator is the coldest part. Store foods in the refrigerator accordingly.

Easy Chicken Pot Pie

Makes 6 servings

1 2/3 cups frozen mix vegetables 1 cup cooked chicken 1 cup baking mix ½ cup milk 1 cup cream of chicken soup 1 egg

- 1. Wash hands and any cooking surfaces.
- 2. Pre-heat oven to 400°F.
- 3. Mix vegetables, chicken and soup in ungreased, 9-inch pie plate
- 4. Stir remaining ingredients in a mixing bowl with fork until blended. Pour over vegetables and chicken in pie plate.
- 5. Bake 30 minutes or until golden brown.
- 6. Let cool for 5 minutes and serve.

Cranberry Pumpkin Muffins

Makes: 12 servings Serving Cost: \$0.27

2 cups flour
3/4 cup sugar
3 teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon cinnamon
3/4 teaspoon allspice
1/3 cup vegetable oil

2 egg, large

3/4 cup pumpkin, canned

2 cups cranberries, fresh or frozen chopped

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees.
- 2. Sift together dry ingredients (flour through allspice) and set aside.
- 3. Beat oil, eggs, and pumpkin together until well blended.
- 4. Add the wet ingredients (pumpkin mixture) to the dry ingredients all at once. Stir until moistened.
- 5. Fold in chopped cranberries.
- 6. Spoon into paper lined muffin cups.
- 7. Bake at 400 degrees for 15 to 30 minutes.
