Irrigation Efficiency and Management

Mark Brown, County Extension Agent - Ag and Natural Resources

Since 2011 the Ogallala aquifer has declined an average of 2.88 feet in Lubbock County and 8.77 feet in Hale County. On March 23, a multi-county workshop was held targeting producers from Lubbock and Hale County at the City Hall meeting room in Abernathy. Sixteen participants learned about tools for precision irrigation, as well as cost-share opportunities through Natural Resources Conservation Service to utilize these new technologies.

In addition to the Precision Irrigation workshop, our Staff helped advertise the Texas alliance for Water Conservation's 3rd Annual Water College on January 18 at the Lubbock Civic Center, and provided TDA and CCA continuing education units. A total of 98 participants were involved in this regional event. A total of 35 registered for CEU's (13 from Lubbock County and 7 from Hale County).

In addition, our office promoted the February 15 High Plains Irrigation Conference in Amarillo that attracted approximately 100 participants.

Private Pesticide Applicator Trainings

In addition to providing continuing education opportunities for license re-certification, AgriLife Extension has the responsibility of training pesticide applicators who need a license for the production of an agricultural commodity.

During the first quarter of 2017, 40 people have received this training through the Lubbock and Hale County offices.

Hub of the Plains Ag Conference Held in Lubbock

The annual Hub of the Plains Ag Conference was held February 2, 2017. A total of 45 participants received information regarding: market outlook, pesticide laws and regulation changes, managing resistant weeds and stewardship of new herbicide technologies, tools for precision irrigation, and considerations for lease agreements, Flag the Technology program, soil and nutrient management, and spider mite control in corn. Lubbock County Extension Agent-IPM Katelyn Kesheimer spoke about best management practices for the sugarcane aphid and sorghum in 2017.

Lubbock County Agricultural Increment Estimates Completed

Each year, Extension agents in each county office complete an annual Agricultural Increment Report that provides an estimate of gross farm level receipts from agricultural related commodities produced in that county. The Lubbock County staff completed this report with the assistance of the Lubbock County Ag Committee and various agri-business representatives. Lubbock County's gross farm receipts were estimated at \$229.7 million dollars for 2016.

The 2016 area cotton crop was much better than expected due to a favorable fall. Cotton prices for 2017 are better than last year, but corn and sorghum prices remain low. *Issues Addressed: Ag Literacy/Educating the Public about Agriculture.*

Caprock Crops Conference

Katelyn Kesheimer, Extension Agent - Integrated Pest Management

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension hosted the Caprock Crops Production Conference on January 18 in Floyd County. Lubbock and Crosby County Extension Agent-IPM Katelyn Kesheimer presented data from 2016 research trials on the Southern High Plains. Other presentations covered early cotton planning strategies, new weed technologies, diseases affecting cotton and corn producers,

soil fertility and nitrogen application, legal updates, drift minimization, and cotton production demand and regulations for 2017. One Hundred ninety-four (194) people were in attendance for the presentations and trade show.

Lunch with the Cotton Agronomist

Katelyn Kesheimer, Extension Agent - Integrated Pest Management

A lunchtime meeting was held in Ralls on March 31 for local producers to discuss any questions they had about the upcoming growing season. Texas A&M AgriLife Extension personnel Dr. Seth Byrd, Dr. Peter Dotray, Dr. Katelyn Kesheimer and Caitlin Jackson were all on hand to answer any questions relating to cotton, weeds, IPM, or soil fertility.

Lorenzo Alternative Crops Conference

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service hosted the Lorenzo Alternative Crops meeting on March 21 in Lorenzo. Caitlin Jackson, Crosby County Extension Agent, spoke about drift minimization while Katelyn Kesheimer, Lubbock and Crosby Extension Agent, covered pest issues from the 2016 growing season. Dr. Calvin Trostle, Extension Agronomist, spoke abut alternative crops such as canola and sunflowers.

Lubbock Master Gardeners Interns

The Lubbock Master Gardener Association is going strong with its 2017 Master Gardener Intern class. These 17 interns are members of the community who are passionate about gardening, water conservation, education, and being a part of a great organization! This class is one of four in the state to pilot a brand new online training program, integrating interactive online learning modules and face to face classes with local experts. Interns will complete course work by the end of April and are currently working to finish 50 hours of volunteer service time within the next year. Once those criteria are met, the interns will be certified and will officially be members of the Lubbock chapter of the Texas Master Gardener Association. Commercial Turf and Ornamental Workshop

On January 27th, 2017, 41 area landscapers, lawn care professionals, and homeowners joined Texas A&M AgriLife Extension at the Lubbock County AgriLife Research and Extension Center to take part in the 2017 Commercial Turf and Ornamental Workshop. Attendees learned about horticulture and landscape-related topics including proper turfgrass management, urban integrated pest management, recordkeeping and new pesticide laws, weed control in drought conditions, and sprayer calibration. Experts from Texas Tech university, Texas A&M AgriLife Research, and Texas A&M AgriLife Extension, and the Texas Department of Agriculture were on hand to give presentations and answer questions for the public. Five Pesticide Applicator CEUs were offered at this annual program. Stay tuned throughout the year for information about the 2018 Turf and Ornamental Workshop. Better Living for Texans

E. Kay Davis, County Extension Agent - Family & Consumer Sciences Mary Alice Roberts, BLT Extension Assistant

Participants of the Better Living for Texans (BLT) programs will acquire knowledge related to dietary quality, the importance of physical activity, food resource management, and food safety. Lubbock County participates in BLT at the Gold level (with a Full-time



Extension Assistant). The county will contribute 300 hours of nutrition education for limited income families, will have a minimum of 300 direct educational contacts and will graduate 300 adults from a 4-lesson series. On average, a full-time Extension Assistant should conduct a minimum of twelve to twenty-four (12-24) educational programs per month.

Two Hundred Seventeen seniors at 6 Senior Centers are receiving monthly nutritional programs at BLT qualified centers by the County Extension Agent FCS or BLT Extension Assistant. First Quarter topics included: "Mediterranean Diet," "Love Your Heart," and "Make the Most of Your Microwave Oven" with microwave recipes for 1 or 2.

Programs for this next quarter are: "Diet and Memory: Are They Related?" "Are All Fats Bad?" and "What's the Deal with Sugar?" Texas Tech Dietetic intern, Raul Palacios presented a nutrition program on March 3.

An exhibit on Teen nutrition and MyPlate was presented at the Teen Summit Conference in January.

The South Plains Food Bank Vista Health Committee is planning a health fair for Food Bank Clients in June. One class on MyPlate for 25 students for the Jackson Elementary Youth Leadership group was held March 23rd.

Mary Alice Roberts, BLT Extension Assistant, reported:

Clients of Catholic Charities, Dream Center Church, and Managed Care Center for Addictions, Family Guidance Center and Texas Tech Early Head Start were introduced to Better Living for Texans (BLT) lesson series, A Fresh Start to a Healthier You! The four topics are: Session 1: Creating Safe and Healthier Meals, Session 2: Balancing Your Day, Session 3: Saving More Money at the Grocery Store, Session 4: Celebrating Small Bites. These lessons will be evaluated as a BLT series. Classes were offered in January, February and March.

Courtyard at King's Dominion a Senior Residence, received Nutrition Education programming in January, February and March. The topics were: In the Know about Nutrition-The Mediterranean Diet, Love Your Heart and Making the Most of Microwave Cooking.

Better Living for Texans brochures, Nutrition wrist bands and My Plate handouts were given away to participants that attended the Annual Teen Summit Health/Resource Fair in January, held at Lubbock Cooper High School. On March 31^{-st} MaryAlice Roberts participated in a Health Education and Resource fair for Retired Senior Volunteer People (RSVP) in collaboration with TTU Health Sciences Center. The display consisted of 3 My Plate examples with food models for senior nutrition, assorted nutrition brochures were given away as well as 2017 recipe Calendars.

"Love Your Heart" was the topic discussed on Ag Life Radio Show with Eddie Griffis in February. A healthy diet and lifestyle equal long term benefits for your health and heart.

Texas Tech University Dietetic Intern student Raul Palacios worked 32 hours the week of February 28th thru March 3rd in our office for his Community Rotation. Raul prepared and taught a BLT class with a food demonstration at Catholic Charities. He taught a lesson at Managed Care Center for Addictions on the topic of Sugar and how much is hidden in food and drinks that we all consume. Raul researched Nutrition topics and wrote two articles appropriate for senior citizens. Mr. Palacios and MaryAlice Roberts attended the Stakeholder Meeting in

Lubbock, for Double up Food Bucks presentation at Breedlove Foods. We learned about the program that is to be launched this year at Farmers Markets to increase access to Texas grown fruits and vegetables.

In March, MaryAlice Roberts attended the Healthy Texas Summit for the North/West Regions in Lubbock, Texas. The theme was Health Prevention, Health Promotion and Health Literacy. On the 24th of March, MaryAlice Roberts attended the Vista Health Committee meeting at the South Plains Food Bank in Lubbock, Texas. The committee planned a Community Health Fair for June 26, 2017.

Do Well, Be Well with diabetesTM

Diabetes occurs when the body does not make enough insulin, or the insulin it makes does not work properly. While diabetes is not curable, it is manageable. Skills are needed to



effectively manage diabetes, but education is not always available. Burdens of diabetes mismanagement are disproportionately borne by those with little or no insurance coverage, lower literacy, poor or no English skills, lower educational and income levels, and poor access to transportation.

Do Well, Be Well with Diabetes™ and Cooking Well with Diabetes™ are combined into an 8-week series in Lubbock County partnering with the Community Health Center of Lubbock. The 2016 Annual Report is available on the website. For the first quarter of 2017, 24 attended a class on carb counting, meal planning and label reading at the new Community Health Center of Lubbock and the FCS Agent assisted with calculating the Nutrition information for recipes used by CHCL.

"Wisdom, Power and Control" is also a diabetes curriculum by Texas A&M AgriLife Extension. The 7-week series being conducted by Community Health workers at UMC. Over 400 participated in 2016. The North Region Health Summit had a trac specifically on diabetes and work site wellness programs with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service.

Food Protection Management/Food Handlers

The Food Protection Management program offered through Texas AgriLife Extension is offered by Agents: Kay Davis and Deana Sageser as well as other FCS Agents in the South Plains district. These programs are offered to promote the service of safe food and assist food service managers and employees to legally practice their trade.

Three ServSafe online tests were proctored in the first quarter. One two-day class scheduled in Plainview in March and presented by the Hale Agent one due to the low number registered.

Hale and Lubbock counties plan to team teach classes May 3-4; July 27-28; and October 5-6. Cottage Food Industry and Food Handler's classes will also be offered in the next quarter. One class was held for 2 at



WorkForce in February. The next class will be held at WorkForce on April 21 and June 23.
