Ag Awareness Efforts at the South Plains Fair

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Lubbock County 4-H Clubs had another successful year in the brand new "Children's Barnyard" building at the South Plains Fair. The barnyard was manned daily by 4-H Club members from the following 4-H groups: Teen Council, Shallowater, Wildcat, Cooper, Frenship, Trinity New Deal, Red Raider and Sharp Academy. A total of 320 4-H'ers

and parents manned the exhibit supplying 700 volunteer hours. Animal exhibits this year included: ducks, chickens, ducklings, chicks, a llama, a mama sheep and twins, a miniature hereford, hatching chicks, rabbits and of course the favorite petting goats and sheep. Other Ag Awareness exhibits included the "Commodity Carnival" manned by Texas 4-H Youth Livestock Ambassadors, Ag banners provided by Texas Farm bureau, a Beekeeping exhibit set up manned by the Caprock Bee Keeper's Association and Path to Plate Posters on Poultry and Beef. Decorative straw hay bales were also provided by the Kendrick Family. Approximately 80,000-90,000 South Plains residents were reached through this years exhibit.

4-H Enrollment Time

The 4-H year runs from September 1 through August 31; so its official we are up and going strong! 4-H'ers and volunteers must re-enroll every year to maintain active membership. Membership is now completed online through 4-H Connect. There is a link on the County Extension website (see 4-H Enrollment - Connect). 4-H'ers age 9 years old or in the 3rd grade through 12th grade may enroll. There is a \$20 enrollment fee through October; after this date, the fee is \$25 per member. Clovers (youth ages 5-8) may also enroll, however no enrollment fee is required. This is the 5th year for our 4-H Clover Project series. For the Clover meetings, we meet monthly for a one hour project meeting related to on-going 4-H projects. The clover meetings focus on exploring 4-H opportunities just for clovers and gives them information about the opportunities available when they become a 4-H'er. Clover meeting dates for the remainder of the year are November 7 and December 6. Clovers entered 83 items in the South Plains Fair youth division. Projects were made at our Summer Clover Day Camp and at our September Meetings.

2017-18 4-H Year in Review

For the 2017-18 4-H year, we experienced a continued growth in our traditional 4-H program. 450 youth were enrolled in 8 4-H clubs which included: Cooper, Frenship, New Deal, Red Raider, Sharp Academy, Shallowater, Trinity and Wildcat. Special interest and curriculum enrichment programs reached 3,078, Lubbock County youth. These programs included: Hatching in the Classroom, Ag in the Bag, Distracted Driving - Shallowater and New Deal, and Summer Community Center Series programs.

Better Living for Texans

- Better Living for Texans qualified senior citizens centers are receiving a monthly nutrition program. This past quarter programs included: "Protein for Seniors," "Food Safety and Selection at Farmers Markets," and "10 Tips on Eating Out." The program was delivered to 444 BLT senior citizens by Kay Davis. One-Hundred Eighty home delivery clients also received the flyers.
- Maggie Trejo, Mae Simmons and Copper Rawlings Community Centers Youth Food Service Camp Programs received nutrition Education twice a month in July and August reaching 114 youth in 5 programs by Kay Davis.

In July, August and September the Texas Tech University Dietetic Internship program provided us with one dietetic intern to complete their Community Rotation for this year. Intern Catherine Arcaro spent 32 hours in September teaching adult classes at Walker/MASH House and senior centers. Each intern is asked to write nutrition articles for Senior adults to be published at a later date.

Mary Alice Roberts, BLT Extension Assistant reports on the following programs:

Clients of Family Guidance Center, Hill Crest Manor, and Managed Care Center for Addictions were introduced to Better Living for Texans (BLT) lesson series, A Fresh Start to a Healthier You! The four lessons are: Session 1: Creating Safe and Healthier Meals, Session 2: Balancing Your Day, Session 3: Saving More Money Session 4: Celebrating Small bites. Each session contained a recipe with food demonstration and tasting. These lessons will be evaluated as a BLT series.

In The Know about Nutrition Education programs were offered at Courtyard at King's Dominion Senior Residence, Maggie Trejo Senior Center, and Foster Grand Parent Volunteers.

• July topic: Protein for Seniors Frequently asked Questions,

Summer Food Service Kids Camps continued in July at Copper Rawlings Community Center, Mae Simmons Community Center and Maggie Trejo Super Center.

The nutrition topics were: July: Fruit and Vegetables with most programs including a food demonstration and tasting. The day campers all received My Plate handouts, work sheets, coloring sheets, jump ropes, recipes and bookmarks relating to the topics presented.

A program on Healthy snacks with a food demonstration and tasting in July for Grandparents as parenting partners at Cumberland Presbyterian Church was presented.

In July, Extension Assistant Roberts, attended the Texas Hunger Initiative Senior Hunger Action Team (South Plains Hunger Solutions) meetings to gain information on the problems facing senior adults in Lubbock County.

One Food Handler class was held for 133 at SPCAA Head Start for employees. This enables these persons to obtain jobs in food service.
