If you are receiving this 4-H Newsletter, you are an official enrolled member in 4-H. With the changes as of September 1, an enrollment fee of \$25 per year is now required for all 4-H members. (Clovers do not have to pay an enrollment fee.) Enrollment is now done only "on-line through 4-H Connect." Youth may join at any time through this online process. Please remember that to compete or participate in any 4-H project meeting, activity, club meeting or contest – all youth must be official 4-H members.

4-H PARENTS ATTENDING STATE 4-H ROUNDUP

At the September 4-H PLA meeting, a new rule was instigated requiring parents attending State 4-H Roundup to work at least 2 4-H fundraisers in order to have some expenses paid by PLA. Official 4-H Parent chaperones will be reimbursed up to \$100 for gas (receipts required), hotel rooms (2-3 assigned per room) and registration. Eligible 4-H PLA fundraisers include: the Lamb/Goat Jackpot, the 4-H Barnyard and the 4-H Concession Stand. Please contact Ronda if you have questions.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Aubrey W. Russell 4-H Scholarship

The Aubrey W. Russell Scholarship is a \$600 scholarship to assist a worthy District 2 4-H member to attend a college or university in the South Plains District (2) to major in home economics or a related field. An additional scholarship(s) may be awarded if there are two or more eligible applicants and contributions are adequate. The scholarship is awarded as follows: \$300 for the Fall semester following the judging, and \$300 for the Spring semester following judging.

Donors:

This scholarship fund is made up of voluntary contributions from Family and Community Education Clubs, individuals, and other groups in the Extension South Plains District (2).

Eligibility:

- 1. Has completed or is enrolled in the third year of 4-H in the South Plains District.
- 2. Has not previously won this scholarship.
- 3. Plans to major in home economics or related field, including education, food technology, or pre-nursing.
- 4. Plans to attend (or is attending) a college or university in the South Plains District that offers a pre-home economics degree or bachelor's degree in home economics or related field, as mentioned above.
- 5. Plans to attend the Fall and Spring semesters following scholarship judging.
- 6. Meets entrance requirements at the selected college or university.

Materials to be Submitted:

- 1. A completed 2019 Aubrey W. Russell 4-H Scholarship Application Form (abbreviated copy). Available from the Extension Office.
- 2. One copy of high school transcript or college transcript, if applicable.

Due Date:

The application materials are due to the Lubbock County Extension Office by *February 15*, 2019. Let us know if you are interested.

TX 4-H Foundation Scholarship

Texas 4-H Scholarship applications are due to the County Extension Office by *Monday, January 28*.

Qualifications for submitting a 4-H Foundation Baccalaureat Scholarship application include: Texas resident who will graduate from a Texas high school during the 2018-2019 school year, has a minimum SAT score of 1350 (old score) or ACT score of 19, has passed the TAAS/TASP test and plans on attending a Texas college or university. If you have any questions, please give us a call. A completed FAFSA is also required.

There are two other categories of 4-H Foundation Scholarships. These include: Technical-plan to attend a technical school for specialized training; and Courageous Heart - nominated by an individual or leader, must have documentation of overcoming a life obstacle such as medical, family or education (may not be nominated by a relative). Applications may be picked up from the Extension Office or from the State 4-H Website. Please contact Ronda if you need assistance or have questions.

TEEA 4-H Scholarship

The Texas Extension Education Association is once again offering on \$1,000 scholarship in each Extension district (total of 12) for deserving Texas 4-H members.

The eligible requirements for those applying are:

- Be a United States citizen.
- Be currently an active senior 4-H member in good standing with county 4-H program for the last four (4) years.
- Demonstrate leadership and personal development through 4-H.
- Will attend an accredited institution of higher learning: university, community college, trade or technical school in fall following judging.
- Have not passed 19th birthday before January 1 of current year.
- Have not previously received the State TEEA scholarship.
- Complete a Texas 4-H Recordbook (updated through previous year's Texas 4-H Recordbook judging deadline).
- Complete TEEA 4-H Scholarship Application and provide other required materials.

Application submission process includes:

- 1. Postmarked on or before *February 15*, submit to the county AgriLife Extension office in a manila envelope:
 - Envelope labeled with the applicant's name and county.
 - Only a black and white copy of Texas 4-H Recordbook from the previous year's Texas 4-H Recordbook judging deadline of August 31 accepted.
 - Official high school transcript with ACT and/or SAT scores included.
- Completed TEEA 4-H Scholarship Application.
 - Two letters of recommendation: one from a county Extension agent or 4-H club manager and one from a teacher, employer, or community leader (not a relative).
- If the applicant wants these materials returned, include a postage-paid, self-addressed envelope and letter of request.

Deadline for submission to County Extension Office is *February 15, 2019*.

TEEA Alumnae Young Adult Scholarship

The number of scholarships and the amount are dependent on availability of funds. Funds for the scholarship are raised by donations, memorials, and fundraisers by members of the Alumnae Committee. Anyone may contribute to this scholarship fund.

General Information

- 1. The applicant must be a former 4-H member **or** the son/daughter or grandson/granddaughter of a current TEEA member.
- 2. The applicant must be between the ages of 19 and 24 at the time of application.
- 3. Applications are available from County Association Chairs, District Directors, and the Chair of the Alumnae Committee. A copy of the application is also located in the TEEA Manual (Chapter 12) and on the TEEA website (http://teea.tamu.edu/manual/chapter12.pdf).
- 4. Applications are due by *March 1* to the Chair of the TEEA Alumnae Committee.
- 5. Applications will be judged at the TEEA Spring Board meeting and winners will be notified after the meeting.
- 6. The applicant must remain a full-time student, or the amount will be returned to TEEA.
- 7. The scholarship may be applied for use at the beginning of the school semester and used as needed.

Lubbock County Parent Leaders Scholarship

The Lubbock County Parent Leaders Association and South Plains Fair are sponsoring a Scholarship program for 4-H youth completing their Senior High School year. These applications are due to the County Extension Office the same time record books are due. The information needed covers three years of your Senior 4-H career with the final year being your Senior High School year. If you did not receive a form, or have misplaced yours, contact the County Extension Office to receive another form. The form is your responsibility to complete the required items and to keep track of.

Texas 4-H Fashion Storyboard Contest

The purpose of the Fashion Storyboard Contest is to give 4-H members an opportunity to create illustrations of their original design and display their work in a storyboard format, similar to that used in the fashion industry. Through project work, the 4-H member has the opportunity to gain knowledge of the career responsibilities of a fashion designer and illustrator, enhance creativity and originality and develop visual communication skills.

Show Rules and Guidelines

- 1. Open to any meat goat exhibitor residing in Lubbock County - No minimum age, must not exceed the age of 19 or a Senior in High School (All ages will be determined as of January 1, 2019.)
- 2. Must be state validated.
- Weathers and/or does allowed.

- 4. Minimum weight 50 lbs. no maximum
- 5. Horns allowed, but must be tipped.
- 6. Must be uniformly slicked sheared, no longer than 3/8 inch above the hocks.
- 7. Complete set of milk teeth, not required.
- 8. Official weigh-in 5:00-6:00 pm.
- 9. Buckles awarded for Grand, Reserve Grand.
- 10. Showmanship will be judged this year! 4 Classes
- 11. Buckles to Showmanship Winners Sr. (15-19 years old), Intermediate 12-14 years old), Junior (8-11 years old), PeeWee (7 years old and under).
- 12. Show out of trailer.

SCHOOL EXCUSES

The form for School Excuses were due **December 2018** to the County Extension Office. If you are going to miss school due to Stock shows, and have not turned in a form, obtain a form and return it to the Extension Office **immediately**. Unless a form is turned in, a letter for an excused absence on your behalf will not be sent to your school.

REMINDER: Blanket excuses and eligibility information has been requested by our office for the shows entered. Parents, please notify your 4-H'ers principal of the exact dates of upcoming school absences. Make sure that you understand your school district's policy for the 10 day/90% attendance requirements. Visit with school instructors to determine plans concerning homework, tests, projects, etc. and to make sure that your 4-Her is passing all subjects prior to and during the absence period. Eligibility for competing in any event must be determined prior to the event, whether you are missing school or not. The Extension Office sends correspondence for all events to each school prior to the competition. In order for youth to compete they must be considered academically eligible by your school.

COUNTY-WIDE 4-H VETERINARY SCIENCE PROJECT INTEREST

AIMING FOR THE BULL'S EYE 4-H Shooting Sports Review



The time is at hand to begin 2019 Spring 4-H Shooting Sports projects, which includes the smallbore rifle and archery projects. If you have not registered with the county office for these projects, please call 775-1740 at your earliest convenience to make sure you are on our contact list for 2019 Shooting Sports Updates.

2019 3-Position Rifle Project

The spring rifle project involves indoor target shooting in the prone, standing, and kneeling positions. Firearms and equipment are provided. The project is taught by NRA-certified volunteer coaches. Shooters must provide hearing protection (foam ear plugs work best) and eye protection. The project will include county, district, and state competition levels.

A project orientation for new shooters (including gun safety) will be held at the County Extension Office building, 916 Main Street, Suite 401 on Tuesday, January 8 at 6:30 p.m. Please enter through the South doors of the building, someone will be there to let you in the building.

Experienced shooters will be notified when practices will begin. Practice sessions will be held at Patriot Shooting Range, 5840 49th St. Details regarding practice schedules will be sent to the participant list via e-mail.

Reminder - All shooters must be registered on-line as a Texas 4-H Member for the 2018-19 4-H Year.

2019 4-H Archery Project

The 4-H Archery Project involves target shooting with either traditional or compound bows. Because of the interest in this program, plans have been made to offer this project at two locations. County shooting equipment is available, but limited.

Step Up & Scale Down with New 8-Week Program

The series will kick off January 10, 2019 at Catholic Charities, 102 Ave. J, Lubbock, TX 79401. Classes will be held at 10-11 AM for 8 consecutive Thursdays. Step Up & Scale Down is a great program to do with a friend or family member. It's always easier to reach your goals when you have additional support.

The program consists of weekly lessons to help participants move toward a healthier weight and includes a weekly weight check-in, weekly challenge to "stay the course," Dinner Tonight! healthy recipes and tips, exercise resources, and a weight-loss planner. The sessions include: Scale Down by Setting Goals; Step Up to a Healthy Plate; Scale Down by Label Readying; Step Up to Breakfast and Menu Planning; Scale Down with Moves to Lose; Step Up Your Hydration; Scale Down by Finding your Motivational Mojo; Step Up to Healthy Snacking; Scale Down with a Colorful Plate; Step Up to Successful Socializing; Scale Down by Knowing Your Numbers; and Step Up and Celebrate.

The Step Up & Scale Down program is based on the USDA Dietary Guidelines, which are intended to help Americans choose a healthful eating plan. Step Up & Scale

Down is a researched-based program that has proven success in weight management and building healthy lifestyle habits.

MASTER WELLNESS VOLUNTEER TRAINING KICKS OFF STATEWIDE IN JANUARY

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service will begin a new series of Master Wellness volunteer training programs across the state in January, and anyone interested in promoting health and wellness is welcome to join the effort, said Andy Crocker, AgriLife Extension statewide program specialist in gerontology and health, Amarillo.

"In the U.S., 86 percent of all health spending is related to chronic conditions - things like diabetes, high blood pressure, high cholesterol and many others," Crocker said. "According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, these costs can be managed and potentially reduced through education and lifestyle modification."

Master Wellness volunteers undergo 40 hours of training on health, nutrition and food safety and commit to providing a equal number of hours toward outreach and education, helping reduce the burden of chronic conditions in Texans and Texas' communities, he said.

Once trained, Master Wellness volunteers will have the opportunity to serve by giving presentations for local community groups, assisting with healthy cooking demonstrations, participating in health fairs and much more.

"It doesn't matter that you are not a health professional," Crocker said. "We welcome participation from anyone interested in promoting health and wellness: college students, employees, retirees - anyone."

Because each community is different, he said, Master Wellness volunteers work with AgriLife Extension county agents and other stakeholders to identify needs and opportunities to help make a difference locally.

"We also know that all our volunteers come from diverse backgrounds, so they're often able to identify novel topics, audiences and resources in the area," Crocker said.

He said in January, the agency will convene a statewide training for Master Wellness Volunteers, but those interested do not have to leave their county. Two of the inperson sessions will be held at the county office; the rest of the training will be conducted online.

"It's never been easier to give back to your community," Crocker said.
