

The Lubbock County Parent Leaders Association is sponsoring a Scholarship Program for county 4-H youth completing their Senior High School year.


Applications are due at the same time as recordbooks - *June 24*, and are available on the County website.

Lubbock County Gold Star Judging will be held on **Thursday, June 27** in the afternoon. <u>Applications are due</u> <u>on June 24</u>. A recordbook must be submitted to be eligible for Gold Star. The Gold Star application is on the County website under Publications/4-H.

RECORDBOOK WORKSHOP

If you haven't attended a county recordbook workshop, please contact Ronda to be sure you are using the correct forms if you plan to complete a 4-H



recordbook. The recordbook consists of a binder (doesn't have to be a 4-H binder), the personal information page, the 4-H story and photo portfolio and the District 2 or Senior 4-H Report form. All of these forms are available on the County 4-H website. The 4-H Recordbook Participant Guidelines will also assist you in putting the correct information together. For intermediate and juniors - DO NOT use the forms off of the State 4-H website – they are different. There were changes at State for recordbooks this year.

A beginner's Record Book workshop will be held on **Tuesday, May 21 at 5:45 pm** at the County Extension Office. Bring all of your recordbook questions and materials to begin work on your recordbook. Please call the County Extension Office, 775-1740, by <u>May 20</u> if you plan on attending the training. If you are interested in doing a recordbook, but have not been able to attend a training, please contact Ronda for more options.

On **Monday**, **May 20** at 5:30pm we will have a countywide Recordbook Workshop at the County Extension Office.

County recordbook Judging will be held on **Tuesday**, **June 25**, beginning at 5:30 pm. All volunteers are welcomed to assist with judging. Judging is a great way to learn more about the process. Please RSVP to Ronda by *June 24*, if you can assist!

Youth Range Workshop

The 65th Annual Youth Range Workshop is being held on **June 13-28, 2019** at the Texas Tech University Center at Junction, Texas. Registration of 4-H and FFA youth for this 6 day training is open. Youth from the ages of 14-18 years old who have an interest in the management of the

largest natural resource in the state of Texas, rangeland will be accepted to participate in the workshop. The workshop covers 26 major topic areas of knowledge from rangeland ecology, ecological principles, natural resource management, rangelands of the world, plant identification, toxic plants, plant collecting, rangeland hydrology and watershed management, grazing management, range animal nutrition, management tools such as prescribed burning, land and ranch planning, wildlife management, the water cycle, endangered species, invasive organisms, rangeland monitoring, daily public speaking activities, leadership roles and many more. During the week, field trips are made away from the Tech Center to the Kerr Wildlife Management Area near Hunt, a ranch in Menard County and a ranch in Mason County. Training is provided in a classroom setting but is followed up with hands-on training outdoors in the field. The Workshop directors have a great expectation from this opportunity that participating youth will return home not to just help make decisions on family property but that they become a resource in their individual county and serve as a junior leader or teen leader in the 4-H range science project area. The Youth Range Workshop has been held every year since 1955. More than 2000 Texas youth have participated in this learning opportunity. The workshop concerns education and knowledge but recreation from swimming, volleyball and softball are all part of the daily activities of this program. 4-H youth from all over the state of Texas participate in this event. STATE 4-H DISCOVER SCIENCE METHOD RESEARCH POSTER CONTEST

This year at State 4-H Roundup, they will be awarding cash awards to **senior age division 4-H members (grades 9-12)** during the 2019 Texas 4-H Roundup - Discover Science Method Research Poster Contest. This is an invitational contest which will be held on Thursday, June 13th. Intermediate age division contestants will receive award prizes per category. Entry information is due *May 16*. This competition has been conducted for the past 4 years, with entry requirements being similar to the past. Contest categories include: Biochemistry/Microbiology/Food Science, Environmental Science/Chemistry/Earth Sciences, Animal Science, Plant and Soil Science, Engineering/Physics, and Consumer Product Testing.

KAY's KORNER

Cleaning and Sanitizing Surfaces and Toys

Dangerous germs – like *hepatitis A* virus and *rotavirus* – can live on surfaces for several weeks. If someone touches those surfaces, germs can get on the person's hands and

then be transferred into the mouth, to other people, or to food. That's why it's so important to clean and sanitize frequently-touched surfaces.



- Clean the surface with hot water and soap and thoroughly rinse. Apply the sanitizing solution and allow to air dry. Use this method also to clean and sanitize high chair trays, sinks, kitchen counters, and large plastic or rubber toys.
- Wash cutting boards, dishes, utensils, and counter tops with hot water and soap after preparing each food item and before you go on to the next food.

- Wash high chair trays with hot water and soap after every use and dry thoroughly with a single use paper towel.
- Cutting boards, dishes, utensils, and small plastic toys can also be run through a dishwasher at 170 °F to disinfect them.

Cleaning and sanitizing aren't the same.

Cleaning – which is removing dirt and debris – comes before sanitizing. A sanitizing solution is then used to kill germs. Here's a "recipe" for a safe and effective sanitizing solution: combine 1 tablespoon liquid chlorine bleach with 1 gallon of water in a clean bucket.

National Mental Health Awareness Month

May is National Mental Health Awareness month. The National Alliance in Mental Illness (NAMI) reports that 1 in 5 youth between the ages of 12-18 have or will have a mental health condition. NAMI goes on to report that 50% of all mental illness will begin by age 14 and 75% will begin by age 24. It is vital to identify mental health challenges such as mood disorders, behavior of conduct disorders, or anxiety disorders, especially since 90% of those who died by suicide had an underlying mental illness. Suicide is the 3rd leading cause of death for youth and young adults between the ages of 10-24. Mental illness can contribute to involvement with the justice system, homelessness, and co-occurring addition issues. All of this highlights the importance of recognizing mental health challenges in youth and young adults. If you would like to receive training in recognizing mental health challenges in youth and young adults (ages 12-18), you can be certified in the nationally recognized program Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA). YMHFA trains individuals to use 5step action plan to recognize and assist youth who display mental health challenge or crisis. Difficult Family Discussion Summer Series

It would have been nice if our kids came with a manual that explained all the intricacies of childhood, adolescence, and young adulthood. No such luck! We have to learn how to parent and we have to work to develop relationships with our kids. The Difficult Family Discussions workshop series will help parents and their teens develop skills they need to have open communication and healthy relationships. Workshops will be held from 10am-12pm at Buckner Family Hope Center located at 1510 S. Loop 289. Parents are invited to attend with their teens (ages 12-17). Workshop dates and titles/topics are: Finding Common Ground (art activity) on May 29, Money Matters on June 12, Sharing Your Values and Expectations with Teens on June 26, Growing up-Puberty and Reproductive Health on July 17, and Cooking Together on July 31. Puberty and Reproductive Health Educational Presentation

Adolescence is a time of rapid change between childhood and adulthood. Some of those changes are easy to see and explain. We expect kids to get taller and develop skills that allow them to be self-reliant. Other changes are harder to see and difficult to discuss, like puberty and sexual development. But, you are not alone. AgriLife Extension will be partnering with Parkway Sommerville Center and the Lubbock Area Teen Pregnancy Prevention Coalition to host a presentation for parents and youth aimed at educating attendees about pubertal changes, and sharing your expectations and values with your teens. Families are invited to attend with (or without) their youth to receive medically-accurate information about puberty, reproductive health, and how to discuss these sensitive topics with your teen. This educational session will be held on Saturday, May 18 from 11am-1pm at Parkway Sommerville Center located at 405 N MLK Blvd. If you have questions please contact Nancy, County Extension Agent-Urban Youth Development, by email (nancy.trevino-schafer@ag.tamu.edu) phone (806-775-1740).
