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#### **4-H ENROLLMENT TIME**

It is time to enroll in 4-H for the 2019-20 year. It will again only be done through 4-H Connect and the yearly membership fee of \$25/member for September and October is in effect. As of November 1<sup>st</sup>, it will be \$30; Clover kids do not have to pay an enrollment fee, but still need to enroll. If you were in 4-H last year - you have a profile - please use your email and profile that you had last year. If you have forgotten your password 4-H Connect will send you a new one. Please do not

create a new profile if you had one last year. Please contact Ronda if you have questions or problems enrolling.



Please remember that 4-H has changed our enrollment to be based on the school grade, instead of the age. Please refer to the information listed below:

**4-H** Members

- 1. Age Requirements
  - •Youth may participate in 4-H year from September 1st of grade three through August 31st following completion of grade twelve, with these age restrictions:
  - Minimum age 8 (in addition to being in the 3rd grade)
  - Maximum age 18 (as of August 31, 2019)

• Special education youth who are older than 19 and have not graduated from high school may participate in 4-H Youth Development programs as members, with approval by the county Extension agent. Participation is limited to the club or county level. County Extension staff have the option, on a case-by-case basis, to allow Special Education youth older than 19 to participate in competitive events at the club or county level.

- 2. Texas 4-H Member Categories o Junior - Grades 3, 4, and 5
  - o Intermediate Grades 6, 7, and 8
  - o Senior Grades 9, 10, 11, and 12
  - Clover K-2nd Grade (No membership dues)

# MAJOR CHANGES REGARDING DISTRICT 4-H CONTEST PARTICIPATION

This year, the Lubbock County 4-H Parent Leaders Association will not be able to pay for District 4-H Contest entry fees. Registration for District 4-H Contests and paying online for those who have qualified will be the responsibility of the 4-H'er qualifying (placing first in most competitions) in order to compete at District. We are in the process of trying to raise funds to cover these expenses. This is why it is important to support our County 4-H Fundraisers. Entry fees range from \$10 - \$20 per contest; cost information will be available prior to registration to assist families in preparing for this additional expense. A 4-H'er will be eligible for reimbursement for one qualifying contest in the Fall and one in the Winter/Spring; reimbursement will require the 4-H'er to complete the reimbursement request and a thank you; Participation in County 4-H Fundraisers is also required. Mark your calendar for Saturday, October 12. 4-H'ers across the State will be conducting community



Participation is required all four years of high school. Qualifying graduates have received a \$500 scholarship. Please contact Ronda if you have questions.



# **4-H VET SCIENCE PROJECT MEETINGS**

For those of you who are interested in a career related to Veterinary Medicine, this project is for you. We meet for monthly meetings, covering different veterinary science topics as well as occasional tours. Our next meeting for this year will be held on **Wednesday**, **September 18 at 5:30pm** at the County Extension Office. We will plan monthly meeting dates for the year at this time.

At this meeting, we will have the State Vet Science coordinator presenting information about the certification process, as well as to discuss careers in Vet Science. All age youth are welcomed to attend this informational meeting.

To participate in the certification program, 4-H'ers must be at least 12 years old.



Introduction to 2019-20 Shooting Sports Projects

The 4-H Shooting Sports Project is a comprehensive introduction to shooting sports safety and the fundamentals of shooting disciplines, including: archery, rifle, shotgun, pistol, muzzleloading, and hunting. The project requires the presence and supervision of trained and certified volunteer coaches. Therefore, not all disciplines are offered in all counties. Lubbock County has certified coaches for Rifle, Archery and shotgun.

Also, since direct supervision by certified coaches is a requirement, this program does not allow individual participation. The minimum age to participate in 4-H Shooting Sports, is enrolled in the 3<sup>rd</sup> grade.

Lubbock County Shooting Sports coaches will soon be meeting to secure locations and set 2020 dates for project start-up, including: 3-position indoor rifle and archery in the spring, and shotgun project in May and June.

More details will follow in upcoming newsletters. If you are interested in participating in 4-H Shooting Sports, call the County Extension Office and place your name and which disciplines you are interested in on the "intent to participate" list.

The CEA signature and your shooting sports coaches signature is required on the application, so don't wait until the last minute to complete and submit the application.



#### Junior Master Photographer

The Texas 4-H Junior Master Photographer (JMP) program provides advanced instruction to photography enthusiasts. As a Junior Master Photographer, youth will be expected to return to their counties and districts to serve as teen leaders for the project. Additionally, Junior Master Photographers may be called upon by the County Extension Agent or 4-H Specialist to serve as photographers for various 4-H events and activities. Only dedicated photography project youth wishing to expand their knowledge as well as service to others should apply for this opportunity. In other words, youth do need to have a good working knowledge of their camera prior to attending this advanced training.

To be a certified Junior Master Photographer, candidates must:

- Be in 7th-12th grade
- attend BOTH Workshop 1 and Workshop II
- Complete a competency test with a minimum score of 80%
- Submit four photos taken by applicant demonstrating understanding of instruction
- Participate in a least one practice event
- Complete a photography community service

• Take part in at least two organized project experiences

Although there is no yearly performance requirement, Junior Master Photographers are expected to return to counties and districts to help expand their photography programs. They receive the Junior Master Photographer pin and certificate. Certified JMPs in 9<sup>th</sup> grade are eligible to apply to the State 4-H Photography Ambassador Program.

# THE INFLUENCES OF CHILDHOOD OBESITY

Over the past four decades, the rise in childhood obesity has significantly impacted many children, adolescents, and adults. The centers for Disease Control states that 1 in every 5 children in the United States has obesity. Children with obesity are at a higher risk for developing chronic health conditions, such as asthma, joint and bone complications, sleep apnea, and type 2 diabetes. They are also at a higher risk for developing heart disease, due to potential high blood pressure and high cholesterol. Children with obesity are more likely to be obese as adults which increases the risk Type 2 diabetes and heart disease, as well and many types of cancers

There are many factors that have a major influence on obesity in children. Eating behaviors, lack of physical activity, metabolism and family genetics are the most individualized factors; however, home environment and social factors play a huge role. "One of the most influential risk factors of them all is screen time," says Elaine Montemayor-Gonzalez, a Health Specialist with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension. "Too much time spent being inactive while watching television, scrolling social media or playing video games may also lead to lack of sleep for some children, which is also a risk factor for obesity," says Montemayor-Gonzalez. There is a cycle of events that all lead to the development of obesity. Over the years there has been a trend of inactivity and easy accessibility to inexpensive, high calorie foods and empty calorie beverages.

How can we help support the healthy growth and development that children need to become healthy adults? It is most important to be a healthy role model for your family, says Montemayor-Gonzalez. "Making health a priority and caring about the quality of the food that your family eats, and how much activity they get is really the firs step" says Montemayor-Gonzalez. She continues, "Seek out help and resources so that you feel supported when making changes for yourself and your family." Try making some of the following changes and look at these helpful resources from Texas A&M AgriLife Extension.

- Physical Activity School-aged youth are recommended to achieve a minimum of 60 minutes or more of physical activity throughout the day. Make a family activity calendar at home and motivate each other to be active together. Enjoy the outdoors and take a walk, ride bikes, build a garden, practice stretching, or play a basketball game in your driveway. Engage in a friendly competition with other families and see who can "Walk Across Texas" first. For more information on a free 8-week physical activity program, visit http://walkacrosstexas.tamu.edu.
- Healthy Nutrition Always plan out your meals before grocery shopping to limit the temptations of unhealthy foods. Choose more fruit and vegetables as snacks throughout the day and make them half of your plate for meals. Drink plenty of water to avoid dehydration and limit sugary beverages. Invite your children to help you prepare and cook a meal, not only is this fun for them, but they are learning about healthy foods. To try some quick and healthy recipes, visit https://dinnertonight.tamu.edu.
- Screen Time Boundaries for screen time and social media should always be followed daily. A good balance will help limit inactivity. It is recommended that children 6 years and older should limit their screen

time from 1-2 hours a day. Set automatic limits on phones and tablets, and motivate your child to engage in youth development programs such as 4-H. To learn more about the hands-on activities in science, health, and agriculture, visit: https://texas4-h.tamu.edu

As parents, grandparents, and guardians we must make positive changes for our children. We are the most important influences in their lives. The positive change for a healthy lifestyle must come from us.

- Must be an active member of a county-level Texas 4-H Shooting Sports project coached by a certified coach.

# Expectations of District 2 Shooting Sports Ambassadors

- Be an active part of the District 2 4-H Shooting Sports program.
- Communicate with fellow district Ambassadors, the adult leader and 4-H Specialist.
- Maintain personal conduct at all times that will represent a positive leader and role model for 4-H and the shooting sports program.
