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4-H ENROLLMENT TIME

It is time to enroll in 4-H for the 2020-21 year. The system has changed this year to 4-H Online. Use the following link to access the new system:

The yearly membership fee of \$25/member for September and October is in effect. As of November 1st, it will be \$30; Clover kids do not have to pay an enrollment fee, but still need to enroll. If you were in 4-H last year – you have a profile – please use your email and profile that you had last year. If you have forgotten your password 4-H Online will send you a new one. Please do not create a new profile if you had one last year. Please contact Ronda if you have questions or problems enrolling.

Please remember that 4-H has changed our enrollment to be based on the school grade, instead of the age. Please refer to the information listed below:

4-H Members

1. Age Requirements

• Youth may participate in 4-H year from September 1st of grade three through August 31st following completion of grade twelve, with these age restrictions:

• Minimum age - 8 (in addition to being in the 3rd grade)

• Maximum age - 18 (as of August 31, 2020)

• Special education youth who are older than 19 and have not graduated from high school may participate in 4-H Youth Development programs as members, with approval by the county Extension agent. Participation is limited to the club or county level. County Extension staff have the option, on a case-by-case basis, to allow Special Education youth older than 19 to participate in competitive events at the club or county level.

MAJOR CHANGES REGARDING DISTRICT 4-H CONTEST PARTICIPATION

This year, the Lubbock County 4-H Parent Leaders Association will not be able to pay for District 4-H Contest entry fees. Registration for District 4-H Contests and paying online for those who have qualified will be the responsibility of the 4-H'er qualifying (placing first in most competitions) in order to compete at District. We are in the process of trying to raise funds to cover these expenses. This is why it is important to support our County 4-H Fundraisers. Entry fees range from \$10 - \$20 per contest; cost information will be available prior to registration to assist families in preparing for this A 4-H'er will be eligible for additional expense. reimbursement for one qualifying contest in the Fall and one in the Winter/Spring; reimbursement will require the 4-H'er to complete the reimbursement request and a thank you; Participation in County 4-H Fundraisers is also required. VOLUNTEER SCREENING

Volunteers and parents also need to enroll or re-enroll on 4-H Connect; there is a \$10 yearly screening fee.

The fee can be paid online with a credit or debit card when the volunteer profile is completed. Please contact Ronda if you have questions. All adult volunteers who serve in a project or club leadership role who work directly with youth, should be screened. Also, any volunteers who assist in transporting youth in their personal vehicles or who handle 4-H funds should be screened.

Volunteers will be required to complete two online trainings before their screening will be submitted (the trainings are required every other year).

Introduction to 2020-21 Shooting Sports Projects

The 4-H Shooting Sports Project is a comprehensive introduction to shooting sports safety and the fundamentals of shooting disciplines, including: archery, rifle, shotgun, pistol, muzzleloading, and hunting. The project requires the presence and supervision of trained and certified volunteer coaches. Therefore, not all disciplines are offered in all counties. Lubbock County has certified coaches for Rifle, Archery and Shotgun.

Also, since direct supervision by certified coaches is a requirement, this program does not allow individual participation. 4-H'ers must attend group meetings. The minimum age to participate in 4-H Shooting Sports, is enrolled in the 3rd grade.

Lubbock County Shooting Sports coaches will soon be meeting to secure locations and set 2021 dates for project start-up, including: 3-position indoor rifle and archery in the spring, and shotgun project in May and June.

More details will follow in upcoming newsletters. If you are interested in participating in 4-H Shooting Sports, call the County Extension Office and place your name and which disciplines you are interested in on the "intent to participate" list.

Shooting Sports - Texas Team

The complete Texas Team consists of 9 disciple teams: Compound Archery, Recurve Archery, Shotgun, Muzzleloading, Hunting Skills, Smallbore Rifle, Smallbore Pistol, Air Pistol and Air Rifle.

My name is Amber and I'm a former 4-H club President from Texas. I'm doing a project to collect 1,000 polite letters from young people to the President and I'll be taking them in person to the White House in a few weeks. I would totally appreciate it if 4-H members in your county would help by writing their own letters and sending them to me.

In 4-H I learned that being able to communicate in a polite, respectful way, is one of the most effective leadership skills you can have. So we are practicing this skill, by writing a thoughtful, handwritten letter to our President. This is a nonpartisan project and young citizens are naturally free to express anything they wish as long as it's done in a respectful way. Many of the letters received so far contain real and thoughtful suggestions along with words of encouragement for our leaders.

If you'd like to participate, please send me a picture of your letter and I will post it to my website and then print it out and take it with me to the White House. (Trip scheduled for the last week of October).

Breakfast: A Great Way to Power Up Your School Day

Regardless of the arrangements for the upcoming school year some things will stay the same. Making sure students eat a healthy breakfast, either at home or school will always be important. Amy Valdez, Extension Program Specialist with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension, shares that "A healthy breakfast can help optimize learning, help children maintain a healthy weight and include foods such as fruits, vegetables, and protein that contain immune supporting nutrients!"

A healthy breakfast should include, but is not limited to, the following components:

• Whole grains such as oats, whole wheat bread, or quinoa

- Lean protein such as eggs or turkey sausage
- Fruit or vegetables such as berries, bananas, broccoli, or spinach

These breakfast components assist our bodies with day to day bodily functions. Whole grains give us energy and fiber. Protein helps to keep us fuller longer, and fruit and vegetables provide us with vitamins, antioxidants, and fiber. Valdez adds, "this combination of food is going to make sure you stay satisfied throughout the day and will keep you energized and focused."

To make breakfast quick and easy, Valdez recommends trying out these ideas below:

- Plan it out! Planning is key when it comes to breakfast. Create a menu of breakfast options for the week. When shopping, stick to these foods to help reduce the chance of choosing unhealthy options and to save you time and money.
- **Prepare the night before** If time is limited in the morning, we tend to choose the first foods we see, which may not always be the healthiest. This can be avoided by either preparing the entire week's meals or simply prepare portions of your breakfast to save you time.
- Visit Texas A&M AgriLife Extension's Dinner Tonight program - Dinner Tonight offers delicious and budget-friendly recipes that your family is sure to love! Dinner Tonight has various healthy breakfast options such as their Greek Yogurt Banana and Blueberry Pancakes or Breakfast Burrito which are great and include whole grains, protein, and fruits or vegetables.
